



Annual Library Vote Tuesday April 2, 1996

9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Each April, the Library Board of Trustees calls on the community to vote on the annual operating budget for the next fiscal year and to elect a trustee. This year one trustee will be elected whose term will commence on July 1, 1996.

Vote will take place at the Northport Public Library, 151 Laurel Ave., Northport.

YOU MAY VOTE in the library election if:

- 1. You are at least 18 years of age.
- 2. You are a citizen of the United States.
- 3. You have been a resident of the Northport-East Northport School District for at least 30 days.
- You are registered to vote. (You are registered if you have voted within the last four years, in a general, school or library election.)

NOTE: Additional parking is available across the street in the Northport Middle School parking lot.

> All voting is at one site, the Northport Public Library. Please let us know in advance if you require any special accommodations because of a disability.

This is a proposed budget which will maintain the library's continued day-to-day operation. In addition to this annual operating budget for 1996/97, the first payment of \$748,500 of the previously-approved bond issue on 9/18/95 due to the School District will be assessed. Therefore, the estimated increase in the tax rate is \$1.11 per \$100 of assessed valuation, which amounts to \$45.20 per year. \$37.15 of this amount will go to make the first payment on the bond issue for the library building program. This amount of \$37.15 will decrease steadily over the next 20 years to \$23.67 in the final year of payment, thus making the average over the 20-year bonding period \$31.00 per year per household.

From Your Library Director,

"How's the building program going?"

This is the question I am most frequently asked these days when patrons stop by my office to chat. Last week, a brochure was mailed to each household to update you on the building project. Additional copies are available at the library and I encourage you to stay informed on the status of our exciting construction which is scheduled to start in July at East Northport and August at Northport.

Next year will be a year of transition. The operating budget we are proposing will bring us through the coming year of our building project with services intact. Each line item of the budget has been built from a zero level to the proposed figures based on an assessment of spending needs. Many lines have been reduced due to the more limited East Northport operation planned during construction.

The biggest increase in spending is to replace our current computerized circulation system (as well as our card catalog and book purchasing system) with one which will enable us to serve you better — and more economically. We will be joining 28 public libraries in Suffolk County to purchase a new system and effect considerable economies of scale — as well as make the borrowing of materials you need from other libraries much easier. The very complicated process of switching 28 libraries to this system should take a year. Fortunately, these one-time start-up costs have come in a year when other budget lines can be held or reduced.

An example of the success of cooperative services of Suffolk public libraries is the implementation this past year of free Internet access through SuffolkNet, our library NETWALK connection. To date, close to 300 patrons have received accounts through our library. To keep our patrons further connected, the library sponsors a monthly Internet User Group Meeting which is well received and attended. Cooperative library efforts reduce costs, offer public access to current technology and by sharing, everyone benefits.

The life, the health, the heart of the day-to-day library operations are transposed into a set of numbers which make up "the budget." This budget represents the Library Board's commitment to you that the library is being governed in your best interest. As I prepare this budget, I am ever mindful of the tremendous trust the Board and the Community have placed in me. The theme for this fiscal year is prudence, practicality, and preparedness.


