Volunteering: The Basics and Beyond

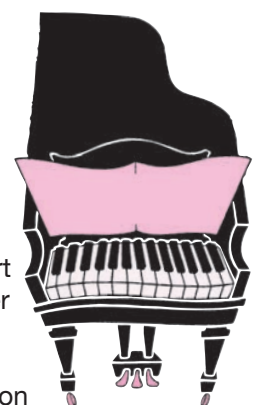

Communication Across the Ages A New Museum Cove Exhibit

Communication is defined as the exchange of thoughts, messages, or information by means of speech, visuals, signals, writing, or behavior. Over the years, methods of communication have evolved and changed with advancements in technologies. Beginning in September, the Northport Library's Museum Cove is hosting a display highlighting how humans have communicated from the earliest days up to the present. **The Verizon Telecom Pioneer Museum** in Commack is our featured partner for this exciting exhibit, and they have loaned the Library some unique examples of the telephone—a vital piece of communication technology that we use every day.

The Verizon Telecom Pioneer Museum opened more than 20 years ago in a telephone company building on Commack Road. It was established by the Long Island Chapter of the Telephone Pioneers of America, a volunteer organization of retired and active telephone company workers. In the Museum, visitors can learn about the history of the telephone, dating back to 1876, through interactive and hands-on exhibits. Guides explain the workings of old telephones, new telephones, coin-operated telephones, telephone booths, and telephone lines. From a stuffed carrier pigeon to an animated figure of Alexander Graham Bell, almost anything to do with communication and the telephone is on display at the Verizon Telecom Pioneer Museum.

Stop by the Northport Library's Museum Cove now through December and take a look at the various items on display. Effective communication is important in work, education, and relationships, and technology has changed the way we interact with one another. Come practice your person-to-person skills with our hands-on activities, and learn about the various ways we communicate by attending one of our forthcoming programs.
