Inventions Helping People Assistive Technology at the Library

In 1976, inventor Ray Kurzweil unveiled a scanning and reading machine that was developed to aid those with a visual impairment or disability that might inhibit their access to information. Over the years, technological advances have been employed to create devices with even more sophistication and ability. The SARA machine at the Northport-East Northport Library is an example of such a device. It is one of many services and assistive technologies that are available at the Northport-East Northport Library.

Any piece of equipment that allows an individual with a disability or special need to perform a function, access information, or increase a capability is considered assistive technology. Some examples of assistive technology include large screen computer programs, scanning and reading devices, large print books, and tactile picture books for children. Below you will find a list and description of the tools and technology available at the Library for the purpose of providing access to all types of information for all of our patrons.

Assistive Listening System

The Community Rooms in both library buildings are equipped with auditory devices to help those with hearing loss enjoy program presentations.

Audiobooks

A variety of fiction and non-fiction books are available on CD. cassette, and downloadable formats for those who may have difficulty reading or holding a book. Audiobooks are available in the Media Centers in both library buildings.

Braille Children's Books

Braille overlays are included in these print books for children and are available in the Children's Room in both library buildings.

Homebound Services

Library materials can be delivered directly to a patron's home when health concerns prevent them from visiting the Library. For more information, contact the Outreach Librarian at 261-2313.

Large Print Books

Fiction and non-fiction titles printed in a larger type size are available for those who have difficulty reading smaller print. Look for them in the Main Reading Room in both library buildings.

Scanning And Reading Appliance (SARA) Located in the Main Reading Room in the

Northport Library, SARA can be used to scan and read documents, or to listen to books on CD or talking books formatted in DAISY.

Tactile Picture Books Children's books with raised illustrations are avail-

able in the Children's Room in both library buildings.

Talking Books Loan Program Through this nationwide loan program, recorded

books and the equipment to listen to them are delivered directly to the patron's home. These materials are available through the Suffolk County Library System.

TTY/FAX



Zoom Text

This special software program designed for those with low vision, magnifies images on a computer screen. Available on computers in both library buildings.
