Chess Club







The library is a terrific resource for research and provides a areat working environment—knowledgeable librarians, security, and a café. One of the best things

is the computer stations, complete with high-speed nternet, Microsoft Office programs, tutorials, and more. The library has been particularly helpful with job search ing. There are business publications, newspapers, a reer center, workshops, computer classes, and employment-related books. In addition, resumes and cover letters can be faxed free of charge anywhere within the U.S., and books and material can easily be obtained from other libraries through interlibrary loan. Some other perks are: a) senior citizens age 65 and er can get a Silver Star Coupon booklet with discounts on café items, fines, copying, trips, book sales and comouter classes; b) suggestion boxes to submit ideas about how to make the library better or report a problem;) free movies every Friday; d) wireless Internet access; e) quiet-study rooms; and f) a full-service website allowing patrons to access their account and renew items remotely from home.
