Now you too can logon to the Internet with your own NETWALK account . . . with your parent's permission. From e-mail to the Worldwide

Web, NETWALK, Northport-East Northport Threshold to World and Local Knowledge, provides you with textbased Internet access to all public resources worldwide. With NETWALK you will have two ways to access the Internet: from home, using your computer with a modem and communications software, or at the Northport Public Library at the Internet station. At your library, access is free. From home, it is the cost of a phone call to Bellport, to the Suffolk Cooperative Library System, our system administrator.

Stop by the reference desk at the Northport building or the East Northport temporary site and ask for the NETWALK application brochure. Anyone under 18



years of age must have signed parental permission. Your parent or guardian must come in to request and sign, in person, the Internet Agreement available at the reference

desk. NETWALK . . . check it out!


