

FRONT AND CENTER: CIRCULATION

At any time of day, the library's circulation desk is a busy center of activity. Personal service is always the focus. As patrons check out and return library materials, they often "swap" reviews of favorite books and videos with the circulation staff. Members of the circulation staff interact with virtually every patron who enters the library. The circulation desk is where the "business" of the library is transacted — apply for a new library card, renew your library card, pick up a book that was reserved or borrowed for you from another library — all at the circulation desk.

In February we made the transition to a new circulation system which has helped to enhance personal service. How many times have you left the library only to receive a phone call from us when you arrive home saying that a book is being held for you? With our new system this won't happen anymore. When you check out materials, the computer will notify us if there are any other materials being held for you. Another check-out feature involves the receipts. In the past, if a book you checked out accidentally slipped under the car seat or a video got mixed up with one of your personal videos (and went out of sight, out of mind) you did not have a printed record of that item until the first overdue notice was mailed. Now, you receive a printed list of titles and due dates of all the items you have bor-

And, like the photograph on this month's cover, it evokes memories of the basic, simple pleasures of visiting the library.*

When we think of the library it is often the basic materials and services which have been available for decades which come to mind. Books, storytimes, newspapers, statistical sources, telephone reference, information and referral, personal service . . . the list is lengthy.

History Lives at the Library

Newspapers capture tomorrow's history and libraries are a home to that history. Each year, many young scouts come with their troops to the library to learn what happened on July 20, 1969**. Then, they turn to the newspapers from the date of their own birth. These are not quiet times at the library; there is much excitement as the youngsters explore their own histories.

Some Things Never Go Out of Style

Thirty years ago, books by Philip Roth, James Clavell, and Irving Wallace topped the bestseller lists. These popular authors continue to publish titles that attract readers and engender followings. When we discover a new author, having read that author's latest book, we want to read more just like it. Often, the library's fiction shelves are home to the previous works by that author. Interlibrary

loan services also play a part in tracking down an author's previous works — if we don't have it, we can often get it from another library. Cooperation is at the foundation of library service and interlibrary cooperation serves the best interests of all public library patrons.

Yesterday and Today Come Together

Many of us collect issues of magazines, but how many of us have room for a favorite "keeper" such as the National Geographic? The library has back issues of National Geographic back to 1919. Fortune, Life, and The Saturday Evening Post are other titles which the library has kept for decades. During the age of computers, we still rely on printed indexes and long runs of journals when doing extensive historical research. Although computer databases are best for recent information, the library puts it all together in one place — you can search online or explore our archives.

Talk is Always "In"

When we read a good book, we love to talk about it. Novel Ideas, our book discussion group, began in 1982. To date, the group has read more than 70 fiction books. Novel Ideas "reads" such as *Remains of the Day, The Joy Luck Club*, and *Prince of Tides* will ring bells with film buffs too — our Novel Ideas librarian has an uncanny talent for choosing books that are subsequently made into movies. Short stories are also fun to read and the art of the short story is basic to the conversations shared during our monthly Book & Sandwich (W)rap meetings. This short story discussion group is enjoying its 14th season at the library. Great Books have been sparking lively debate at the library for more than two decades. This community book discussion group proves the point that the classics know no generation gaps.

Storytelling: The Heart of Our Culture

We all enjoy a good story. Children love to curl up on a favorite lap to listen and read the very same story again and again. Storytimes in the library's children's room continue to be among our most popular programs. Some of the children who enjoy our storytimes today come with moms and dads who were storytime kids at our libraries years ago.

Just a Phone Call Away

Just give a librarian a telephone and you have a community reference resource. Telephone reference has been a cornerstone of the library's information and referral service since its earliest days. Patrons call with all kinds of queries. Whether you are looking for a particular book, want to know when a holiday falls in the year 1999, or need the telephone number for a government official, a professional librarian is as close as your nearest telephone.

A Foundation of Personal Service

Personal service is always basic to the way we run the library. When you call the library, the phone is answered by one of our circulation clerks. Your call will then be "circulated" to the department that can best answer your question. Courteous, efficient, friendly, knowledgeable — our staff wants to help you. Access to yesterday . . . help for today . . . a plan for tomorrow. The library is the place to start.


