

In <i>Mars Beckons</i> , John Noble Wilford examines the mysteries, the challenges, and the expectations of this next great adventure in space. <i>The Case for Mars</i> by Robert Zubrin reinforces our hopes and dreams by arguing that other worlds can be reached affordably and	within our lifetimes. The epic of an earthling born and educated on Mars who arrives on our planet with superhuman powers is the subject of Robert Heinlein's well-known novel <i>Stranger in a Strange Land</i> . In <i>Mars</i> , Ben Bova takes twenty-five astronauts on the first manned expedition to what astronomers have for centuries described as the "bloody planet." "It had a head with two enormous eyes and a mouth without teeth. Around the mouth were many pairs of tentacles." Thus H.G. Call For a Spell Check

Even in this age of computers, one of our most frequently-asked question types is for the spelling of a word. When you are spell-bound, we'll consult desk dictionaries, medical dictionaries, foreign language dictionaries, and the 20-volume Oxford English Dictionary.

Call for Reservations

Give us a call before you come to the library. We will check the shelf for a book, magazine, or compact disk and we will put it aside for you.

Book reviews are abundant — new or favorite titles are featured in daily newspapers and on radio and television talk shows. These talked about books are popular and often generate waiting lists. If you want to read the books that have everyone buzzing, just call us — we'll put your name on a hold list and will call you when a copy comes in and your name is at the top of the list. If school is on your summer schedule, call us from class and we'll try to locate some of the titles on your reading list — if we don't own a title, we'll contact neighboring libraries and ask them to send us the book.

Call about Songs

Often, we are called to exercise our musical memories and have been known to hum a tune and sing a song when asked to locate lyrics or melodies. We have access to sheet music for many popular and classical titles, *Billboard* CD-ROM data, and *Song Index*.

Call Us When You Are Planning a Meal

How do you cook up a favorite recipe when that recipe card is missing from your recipe box? Call the library . . . we have aisles of cookbooks, access to the Internet chefs, and back files for *Newsday* and the *New York Times*. We can find a recipe for just about anything . . . except maybe Aunt Mabel's secret recipe for carrot cake.

Call for Future Connections

There are many ways to keep in touch with a library — especially when its buildings are under construction. The telephone is "an old technology" that keeps on working. We also answer questions sent to us by fax. E-mail is another reliable way to connect to the library. Once construction is completed, you will be able to call the library after hours and a tape machine will lead you to the information you seek about storytimes, upcoming programs, library hours, and other activities. You will also have the capability of dialing in to the library catalog — you can "browse the collection" in the comfort of your own home.

In 1988 an eager group of middle schoolers met for the first time as the library's Young Adult Book Reviewers. Meeting monthly, the reviewers shared their thoughts about the books they read, and in May, 1989, produced the first compilation of young adult book reviews in a slender booklet they named *Journey Into Books*.

As *Journey Into Books* grew over the years, reviewers expanded their reviewing beyond books. Reviews of computer games, music, magazines, movies and, occasionally, a Broadway show began to appear within the covers of *Journey Into Books*.

The Spring 1997 publication boasts a new design and new title. Recognizing that more is being reviewed than just books, we introduce BOOKS, BYTES & BEYOND. Credit for the title goes to David Crean, and credit for the logo concept goes to Elizabeth Richards, both longtime book reviewers.

As we look forward to the tenth year of YA Book Reviewers, we also look forward excitedly to welcoming that 1997-98 group of reviewers in the fall at the new East Northport Library.
