




How much was that house?

Flip through COMPS, a monthly listing of properties sold in the Huntington and Smithtown area.

Did it rain on May 1, 1994?

Try Local Climatological Data — rain, snow, temperature, and wind — this is the resource for local, daily weather stats.

Will I have good weather for my wedding?

Take a look at the Old Farmer's Almanac and Astronomical Charts — predictions in these old standbys are pretty reliable.

Where could I take out of town guests?

Turn to This Month on Long Island for a calendar of monthly special events, lists of golf courses, parks, night clubs, and much more.

How do I get there?

Check subway and bus maps as well as street atlases for Long Island, New York City, and Westchester. When you want to tell guests how to get to your house, use Street Atlas USA on CD-ROM and print out a map of your neighborhood. This computer resource helps you locate street and area maps for any place in the country.

Is there a local Audubon Society?

Refer to the Suffolk Sourcebook for a listing of addresses and telephone contact numbers for organizations, associations, and clubs in Suffolk County. We also keep an extensive file of local contacts.

Who is my local government official?

Call us for the names and numbers of your elected officials on Long Island, in Albany, and in Washington, DC.

Come in, call, or reach us by fax or e-mail. When you ask the questions, we'll find the answers.

The Homebound

The library is an information and entertainment resource for all patrons in the community. If you are physically unable to get to the library, we will deliver library materials to you at your home. For details about becoming a **Homeward Bound** patron, contact Outreach Librarian Margaret Vespe.

Organizations & Clubs

It is always our pleasure to speak before community groups about the services we provide at the library. Our librarians have visited American Legion, Kiwanis, Rotary, Veterans, Chamber of Commerce, and senior groups. For more information about our outreach to clubs and organizations, contact the Community Services Department.

Career Seekers

Since 1993, we've worked with the group facilitators of the Employment Network Program at Our Lady Queen of Martyrs. Reference librarians have introduced program participants to the many books and computer resources available for job seekers. Career assistance has also been given to the Town of Huntington's Resource Center for Persons with Disabilities as part of its Independent Lifestyles Program. Our library also prepared, with the libraries in the Town of Huntington, a bibliography of job search resources entitled *Searching For A Job? Start At Your Library*. It is used in the New Workplace Program of the New York State Department of Workforce Development and is available at other career counseling sites.

Teachers & Students

An exemplary extension of public library resources brought directly into the public school classroom, our **Special Loan Service For Our Schools** (SLSFOS) helps support curricular needs and stimulate classroom activity. This program was developed in January, 1990 by the Northport-East Northport Public Library to make its materials more readily available to the teachers and students of the Northport-East Northport School District. Children's and Young Adult librarians work with teachers to select materials to support curricular needs. These public library materials are then delivered to schools for a short term loan.

Young Hospital Patients

Librarians from the public libraries in the Town of Huntington make weekly visits to the Huntington Hospital pediatrics unit bearing gifts of new paperback books for the children and young adult patients. Librarians visit these young patients, spend time reading with them, and encourage them to continue using their local public libraries when they are home again and on the mend.

Commuters

As you make that "every minute counts" dash to the railroad station, make sure you leave a moment to spare to select a book from the **Read...Ride...Return** racks of paperbacks provided for citybound commuters and daytrippers. Thanks for your help in keeping these racks filled — many of your paperback donations go to work here.

Consumers

Paperwork . . . half the work is getting the papers! Stop by the library for the following forms: voter registration; boat registration; motor vehicle change of address, non-driver identification, sale of vehicle and vehicle registration and title application. When its the season, we have a table of tax forms from the IRS and New York State for you to take — year round we've got master IRS and New York State tax forms for you to copy. We also have information for the college-bound including TAP and FAF financial packets and forms.

Community Groups

We are a community center. When you enter the library, a community bulletin board is home to your announcements for community-minded programs and services. To post material, stop by the reference and circulation desks for a form telling us about the material you wish to post. While you are in the lobby reading the announcements, drop off your used batteries in the Town of Huntington battery recycling bins and give your eyeglasses a new life by donating your old prescription glasses to the Lions Club — just drop them in the container by the front door. Near the entrance to the library are the Huntington Breast Cancer Action Coalition survey forms counted, fill one out today. Brochures, fliers, and calendars from local clubs and town and county groups are available in the "giveaway" racks in the circulation and reference areas.

As the East Northport Library nears completion, and the Northport Library addition takes shape, you can look forward to our new meeting rooms. If you have a local group in need of a meeting place, contact our Community Services Department. We are beginning work on the late autumn, early winter calendars, so give us a call.


APPLE STORY FEST AT RICHTER'S ORCHARD
