We are never too old to enjoy listening to stories. We tell each other stories every day. Many of our stories are born out of ordinary greetings such as, "How was your day?..." or "Guess what happened to me..." Storytelling is a centuries-old tradition. Stories, much like treasured heirlooms, are bequeathed to younger generations of families. When a story is well told, it holds its listeners captive.

Master storyteller, musician, writer, and teacher Odds Bodkin will captivate you. This modern mythologist gives multimedia effects to timeless tales. He tells stories in the bardic style with character voices and full musical accompaniments. Listen to him... "I know hundreds upon hundreds of stories. If a story has been retold for centuries, it obviously touches people and there's a reason for that — its message is fulfilling. I create music, voices, and sound effects to tell the stories in my own way." Mr. Bodkin's storytelling library of audio cassette recordings includes both original and traditional tales. All are performed live. This past spring, his new picture book *The Banshee Train* was published.

Library Connections THE INTERNET



Tradition and technology continue to thrive side by side at the public library. Children's story hours and book discussion groups are as popular as time spent on public computers. Science fiction becomes fact as new technologies find a welcome home in the library. "Cyberspace" is finding its place in the library too. By the end of the month, patrons will have an opportunity to obtain individual Internet accounts. The Northport-East Northport Public Library is one of 13 libraries participating in the Internet project "SuffolkNet" launched by the Suffolk Cooperative Library System. Patrons interested in signing on should stop by the reference desk for details. Get caught up with our technology. Make the public library your Internet connection.

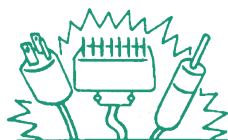
Netymology



The collection of interconnected networks known as "the Internet" was designed more than a quarter of a century ago by the U.S. Department of Defense to link computers used by military and academic researchers. Today, the Internet provides a conduit to millions of computers and routes users to local and global networks. These networks communicate in the same language and allow for easy exchange of data. Gophers, listservs, Veronica, Jughead, the World Wide Web, and Lynx: a whole new lingo has evolved around and about the Internet. The library has many handbooks and directories to the Internet. Reference librarians James Olney and Mary Jane Hunt, coordinators of the library's Internet project, have prepared information packets for patrons who obtain accounts.

Network

To connect to the Internet you need a computer, a telephone line, a modem, and communications software.



Patience and curiosity are also useful tools, as Internet traffic can be "bumper to bumper" and there are many "detours" in the search for data. By the end of 1995, workstations will be available in the library for patron Internet access.

Network

At the Northport-East Northport Library, the Internet is an extension of the library's reference services. Text-based information on the Internet is vast and varied and enhances information available to patrons in some of the more traditional reference sources. From song lyrics to Supreme Court rulings, weather forecasts to astrophysics, you'll find it on the "net." New databases seem to appear daily. Patrons with library Internet accounts will be encouraged to participate in the library's Internet users group, organized by James Olney and Mary Jane Hunt. There is no road map to the information highway called the Internet. User groups fill that gap.

Netmail

In addition to tapping into reference sources, patrons will be able to send and receive electronic mail over the Internet. The Internet has become a global meeting place, a place people "go" to learn and communicate with experts worldwide. E-mail may make the telephone answering machine obsolete. Patrons can use E-mail to query a reference librarian. Internet E-mail is helping to keep families in touch and college students are cutting down on long distance telephone costs thanks to E-mail.



Networth

Access to the Internet is free of charge to all library patrons in good standing. Your investment: time. The Internet is not the place for a quick search. Detours intrigue and enlighten. For the inquisitive mind, the Internet is a feast of facts and fun!

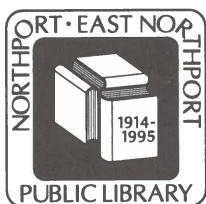
