M.E. Kerr, the 1993 recipient of The Margaret A. Edwards Award for her lifetime achievement in writing for young adults, pays a return visit to the library's SPEAKING OF WRITING program. First here in 1991, Ms. Kerr is one of



many prominent and honored Young Adult authors, among them, Robert Cormier, Walter Dean Myers, and Caroline B. Cooney, who have come to our Community Room in May to speak about writing.

M.E. Kerr will speak to a packed audience of selected community students in grades 6-9, and take questions from the students, each of whom will have read one of Ms. Kerr's books before coming to the program. This popular program is eagerly awaited by local middle schoolers.

M.E. Kerr, now a Long Islander, sees a real distinction in writing for young adults concerned with the basics of making and losing friends and wondering what to do with their lives. Kerr says, "My 'job' as a writer of books for young people is to entertain them, hoping they will want to come back for more."
