**Nationally Recognized Four-Star Library**

**Library Receives Four-Star Distinction for Third Year!**

In its October 2010 issue, *Library Journal* announced its third round of national library ratings. Once again the Northport-East Northport Public Library was ranked among the top 3.5% of the nation's public libraries scored by the *LJ Index* and named a "four-star library" among "America's Star Libraries." *Library Journal's* rating offers an overall indication of how a library's performance compares to peer libraries and provides guidance on how all public libraries can better assess and improve what they provide to their users. The "four-star library" rating is based on four representative service outputs: patron visits, circulation, program attendance, and public Internet usage. This year, 7,407 public libraries were surveyed with 258 libraries nationwide receiving star ratings.

Upon receiving news of the Library's accolade, Library Director Eileen Minogue remarked "Our Library is honored to again receive this national recognition. During this period of economic recession, people are turning to their Library more than ever for job search assistance, information, and entertainment, and our staff is committed to providing the highest quality service to our community."

**Homeward Bound Library Service**

Are you, or is someone you know, unable to visit the library because of a temporary or permanent medical or physical condition?

Our Homeward Bound service is available to all Library district patrons who are unable to come to the library. Tell us what materials you want, or our Outreach Librarians will select books (in large or regular print), audiobooks, or other audiovisual materials for you based on your interests. Whatever you enjoy, we will see that your library materials are "homeward bound" to you. Materials are delivered and picked up by a library courier once a week on either Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday.




#### Teens Meet Distinguished Author
