





Edwin G. Burrows
Author of *Forgotten Patriots: The Untold Story of American Prisoners During the Revolutionary War*
(N) Tuesday, December 16, 7:30 p.m.
Between 1775 and 1783, some 200,000 Americans took up arms against the British Crown. Just over 6,800 of those men died in battle. About 25,000 became prisoners of war, most of them confined in New York City under conditions so atrocious that they perished by the thousands. Evidence suggests that at least 17,500 Americans may have died in these prisons—more than twice the number to die on the battlefield. *Forgotten Patriots* is the first-ever account of this astonishing and little-known story. It is a unique perspective on the Revolutionary War as well as a sobering commentary on how Americans have remembered our struggle for independence—and how much we have forgotten.
Edwin G. Burrows, a resident of Northport, is Distinguished Professor of History at Brooklyn College of the City University of New York. He is the co-author of *Gotham: A History of New York City to 1898*, which won the 1999 Pulitzer Prize for History. He has also received awards from the Municipal Art Society, the St. Nicholas Society, and the New York Society Library, among others. Mayor Rudolph Giuliani named him a "Centennial Historian of New York." For the past five years Burrows has been a Distinguished Lecturer for the Organization of American Historians.




