

library's new dial-in reference database is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week Now, when the weather keeps you close to home or when you need information at a time when the library is closed, you can access thousands of information resources through SEARCHBANK, a cooperative project of the public libraries in Suffolk County. Magazine articles, health information, business data, citations to newspapers . . . it's all available and accessible from your home, school, or office computer via the library's Internet home page.

SEARCHBANK information is current and comprehensive. Popular culture, arts, sciences, sports, fitness, nutrition, public health, prescription drugs, medical concerns, finance, international trade, investments, banking, money management, current events ... the list is long. And SEARCHBANK's easy-to-follow, on-screen instructions will have you downloading and printing out information when you need

it . . . current affairs, background for a speech, travel information . . . it's all here, all the time.



When the library is closed, how can I find out what materials it has?

The library's Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC) is also yours to search through the library's home page. Just click on

"Catalog" and log in "Welcome." The OPAC is user-friendly and accessible. It's invaluable for the student who is typing up a bibliography and needs the source information for a book used just the other day. The computer catalog includes contents information for many of the items in the library's collection. You can search for short stories in collections, plays, poems, songs, and short biographies. One of the most powerful searching tools in the online catalog is the WORD search. Type in the words you would normally use to describe your topic — no need to worry about correct library lingo. You can also type in names of stories, songs, poems, etc. The OPAC lets you see what's in the library's collection anytime you want.

What else can I find through the library's home page?

COMPUTER NEWS FROM CHILDREN'S SERVICES

There's no need for a travel agent to take a trip to the Rain Forest or a time warp machine to visit a Medieval town. Come to the Children's Room and ask for the *Imagination Express Learning Destination* computer programs.

Destination: Castle allows kids to enter a kingdom where knights, dragons, jesters, wild boars, and

falconers become actors in their own interactive stories. While writing imaginary tales using animation, music, and sound effects, children have fun learning about feudalism, chivalry, and Medieval life.

With *Destination: Rain Forest*, children can create stories about the Kuna Indians, exotic plants, and animals while building essential writing skills and learning fascinating facts about Rain Forest ecology and how to protect this endangered environment.

Destination: Neighborhood centers around the familiar places in your child's life: home, school, stores, the park. These everyday places provide your child with an inviting environment for storytelling about real-life situations and a creative venue for expressing thoughts and feelings about personal experiences.

All three CD-ROMS are appropriate for children ages 6 and up and are available for in-library use on our applications computer.

Circulating CD-ROM's

The children's circulating CD-ROM collection has continued to grow. We have programs suitable for children of all ages including Magic School Bus Explores the Inside of the Earth, Arthur's Birthday, Carmen Sandiego Junior Detective, and many others. These programs are available for you to use on your home PC for a seven-day circulation period.


