



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- Coffeehouses -- A Fine Literary Tradition

The literary traditions of coffeehouses date back to the seventeenth century when the ancestors of today's cafes, coffeehouses, and espresso bars were established in Oxford and London in the 1650's. Though coffee had been used as a beverage in the Ottoman Empire since the thirteenth century, it was not mentioned in European writings until 1582. It is believed that major shipments of coffee arrived in Europe via Venice in 1624, then London, Amsterdam, Marseilles, and Hamburg.

Coffee's popularity as a beverage grew with the advent of the coffeehouses of London which became centers of political, social, literary and eventually, business influence. (Lloyd's Coffee-House in London was the birthplace of the insurance firm Lloyd's of London.) In 1675, Charles II of

England closed 3,000 coffeehouses as "seminaries of sedition" but rescinded his order within a few days because of the hue and cry that met his edict.

As coffee's popularity spread from one European city to another and eventually America, each developed coffeehouse customs that suited its culture. In all of Europe, however, the coffeehouse was the place to gather to read and discuss the latest news. For a coffeehouse, subscriptions to newspapers were obligatory and eventually magazines and reference books were offered to guests as well. In Vienna, evolution from coffeehouse newssheets of the seventeenth and eighteenth century to a reading cafe of the late nineteenth century culminated in Cafe Central, a kind of library with coffee service.

Sir Richard Steele in 1709 launched a paper, The Tatler, for coffeehouse patrons. He then collaborated with Joseph Addison to write The Spectator. Dryden, Dr. Johnson, Boswell, Pepys, Congreve, and Swift were all denizens of London's coffeehouses. In Paris, Rousseau, Hugo, and Voltaire could be found at the Cafe de la Regence. Diderot

also worked there on his massive

Encyclopedie.

In 1774 a "Committee of Correspondence," a group of New York City patriots, gathered in Merchant's Coffee House and



drafted a letter to a group of Boston's patriots proposing the union of American colonies.

In the mid 1800's, coffeehouses in England lost their influence in the social and business worlds as private clubs flourished. Throughout the rest of Europe, however, cafes and coffeehouses were still the meeting places for writers and artists: Thomas Mann, Bertolt Brecht, Pablo Picasso, Georges Braques, Erich Maria Remarque, Jean-Paul Sartre, and Ernest Hemingway to name a few.

The 1950's saw the revival of coffeehouses or cafes in this country. Once again they had a literary flavor as the "beat" poets read their works, listened to jazz, and discussed politics. The eighties saw the growth of espresso bars which again

provided a meeting space, a place to read or watch the

world go by.

Today, The Library Cafe at the East Northport Library continues in the footsteps of coffeehouses of old — with a nineties touch. Flavored coffees and teas, cappucino, and cold beverages are available as well as bagels, biscotti, and cookies. Like the meeting places of old, music and poetry are also on the menu twice a month at East Northport during the library's Fireside Fridays (see p 2). The new Library Cafe at Northport will also feature delicious fare and monthly entertainment.

The wonderful coffeehouse traditions of reading, writing, and enjoying the company of others continue at the Northport-East Northport Public Library!







A Few Lines About Lions

Before we began to build our new libraries, I visited the New York Public Library on Fifth

Avenue a number of times, not for specific ideas, but for inspiration — to be uplifted beyond the data, the budgets, the invoices, the investments — and to remain focused on the task of building for our community places which would not only serve our needs, but would please our senses. I knew little about architecture, little about library design and less about construction. We had experts in those areas anyway. What I did know was that my fellow trustees and I did not want us to compromise beauty for function in our new buildings. That great public library on Fifth Avenue was just the place for inspiration.

On my visits I always passed Patience and Fortitude, the two great, gray lions which guard the second flight of steps at the front entrance. Modeled by Edward Clark Potter and sculpted from Tennessee marble by the Picarrilli brothers for a total cost of \$13,000, they have been landmarks since their installation in 1911. These favorite beasts amuse us, in their giant wreaths at Christmas time and recently in their hard hats announcing the renovation of the central reading room. From the lions I learned some lessons about attention to detail in the service of beauty and function.

Even before one enters, the lions establish one of the many design motifs within the building. A careful observer will find lions' heads above doors, their faces in ceiling corners and even on doorknobs. Paws serve as feet for candelabra and faces appear on chandeliers and on the panels of stairway railings. This attention to detail was extended even to table lamps and wastebaskets. Nothing

was left to chance. Beauty was as important as function. The architects, the trustees and the founding librarian had determined that the public would be served, but in a public place that would please their senses, where they would be happy to be, in a public place that would be beautiful.

On a more modest scale and in a very different time and place, I believe we have produced two such public places in our new libraries, places which will not only serve us well, but which will please us for their beauty, and which will make us proud of what we have done together. I believe the lions would be happy in Northport, too.

My wife and I have two small replicas of Patience and Fortitude in our living room, bookends, gifts from friends of ours and fellow builders of our libraries. When I see them, strong and silent, guarding our books, they remind me of the qualities which carried our community to a successful completion of our libraries. Where would we be without the fortitude, the strength of mind of those who struggled to locate, design, and build these places, an effort first undertaken over a decade ago? How could we have succeeded unless that fortitude had been matched by the patience of a community, who, once it had made clear its needs, could wait and watch and trust its representatives to deliver? I suggest that such a coming together of the public will and the response of its representatives constitute a model of what a community can accomplish when a core of committed members have the fortitude and patience to work together.

I thank all my fellow trustees, past and present, the library leadership, and the library staff for their fortitude. I thank the community for its support, its trust, and its patience. We all hope that you, your children, and their children will enjoy our libraries for many years to come.
